MISSION STATEMENT

The Upper Merion Township Police Department is pledged to engage in a cooperative effort with our citizens to achieve and maintain a superior quality of life within our community. To the greatest extent possible, our actions will reflect the priorities of our citizens. Remaining committed to the principles of honesty, integrity, and professional ethics, we will work diligently to reduce the incidence and fear of crime and promote an atmosphere of well being. Our efforts are aimed at helping Upper Merion Township continue to be a good place to live, visit, work and worship.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Upper Merion Township Police Department provides a full range of police services on a 24-hour-a-day basis. The Department services a geographical area of 16.7 square miles and is located in Montgomery County which is approximately 20 miles northwest of Philadelphia.

The Township is bordered by a 4.4 mile section of Route 76 (Schuylkill Expressway); a 5.2 mile section of the Pennsylvania Turnpike; and a 2.2 mile section of the County Line Expressway (Route 422), which are all patrolled by the Pennsylvania State Police.

Historic Valley Forge National Park, being mainly in Upper Merion Township, brings prestige and national recognition to the area. Also located in the Township is a large industrial area, the King of Prussia Town Center, and the expanded King of Prussia Mall, which is one of the largest shopping complexes in the country. In addition to the industrial and business aspect of our community, we also host four elementary schools, one middle school and one high school. Although the resident population is 28,395 (2010 census), the commercial/transit/industrial composition invites an estimated daytime population of over 200,000 people.

The Upper Merion Police Department continually seeks to partner with our culturally diverse community to maintain a safe environment for our residents and the Township's many visitors.

On the Township's web-site (www.umtownship.org) various types of information can be accessed concerning the department's activities; including Crime Alerts, Weekly Crime Bulletins, Safety Tips, Community Response Unit, the Lock for Life Program and a Special Needs Registry. 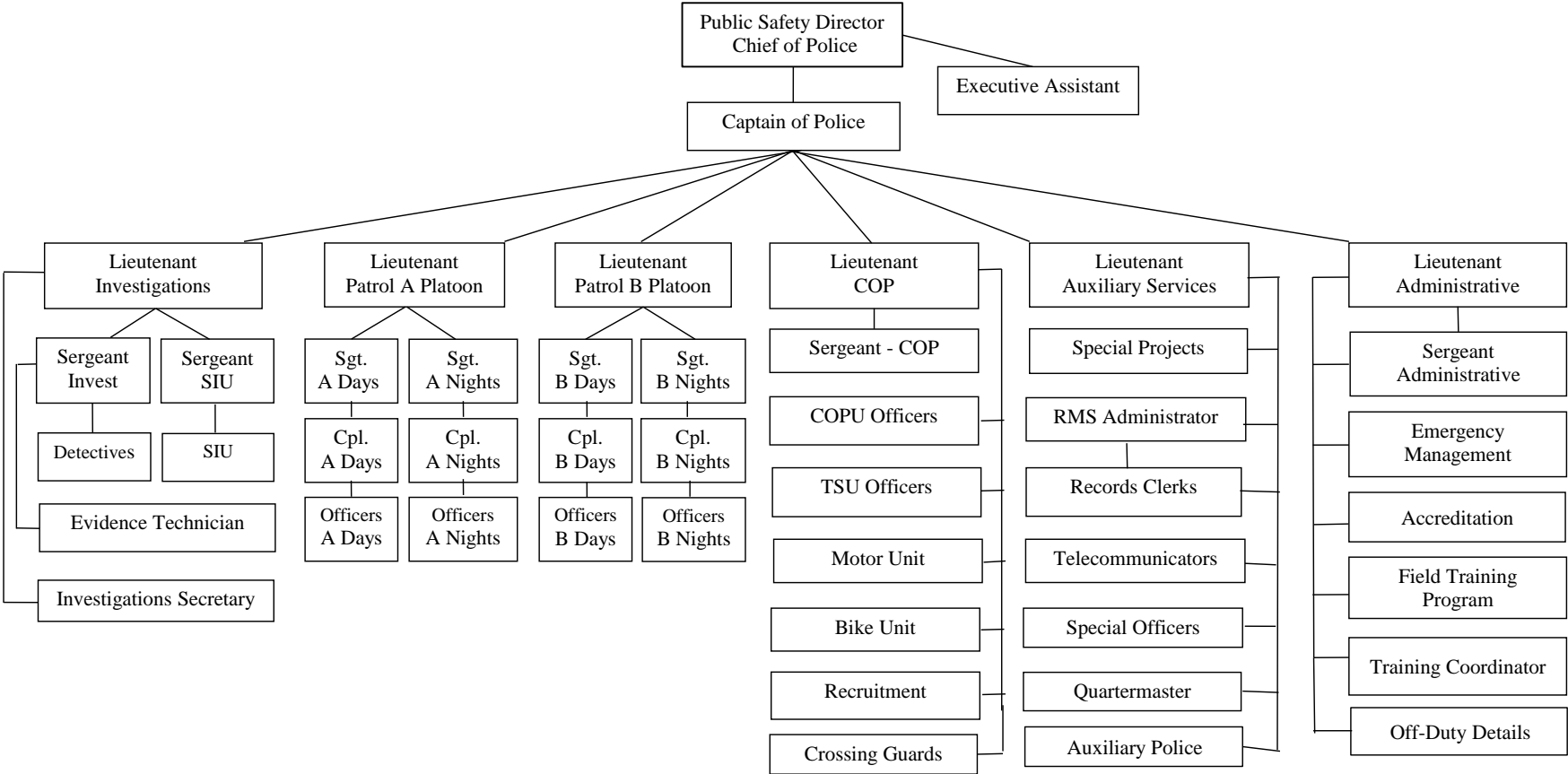

2021 COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING

In March of 1997 the Upper Merion Police Department established a full-time Community Relations Unit which has established a variety of programs to educate our residents and business community. In January of 2013 the Police Department changed the name to the Community Response Unit, along with the structure, to better respond to the needs of the Community, while keeping the integrity of the programs that were started and to add new programs with the intent of expanding services to the community. The change was also intended to highlight the fact that the entire department is community relations oriented and that community policing will remain very active throughout the Township. In 2018, the Police Department's Community Response Unit and Traffic Safety Unit combined resources to better serve our residents. This new unit is now a part of the recently created Community Oriented Policing Division in the Police Department.

2021 POLICE CHAPLAIN PROGRAM

The Police Department established a Police Chaplain Program in an effort to aid the Department in its efforts to advance the Community Policing Concept. The program is a voluntary partnership between the Clergy and the Police Department to help improve the quality of life for residents and the Police Department. The partnership will endeavor to help maintain strong community relations through the exchange of vital information that will help residents better understand police activity and procedures. The Chaplain Program will make counseling and pastoral services available to our Community, and the members and families of the Police Department, whenever such services are requested. The Police Chaplain, who has training in pastoral care in the the world of law enforcement, will offer counseling and spiritual care during emergencies and times of crisis and turmoil, and the aftermath. There are currently clergy members from different denominations who volunteered for the program, and are "on call" whenever their services are requested.

2021 COP CAMP

In 2019, the Police Department again sponsored the Annual Cop Camp in cooperation with the Upper Merion Park and Recreation Department. Since its establishment in 2013, the objective of the camp has been to forge positive relationships between the police and area youth. The Cop Camp "Cadets" are taught teamwork, lessons in personal safety, and respect for themselves and for others as they participate in thought-provoking police-related activities. Cop Camp's regimented police training includes crash investigation and traffic enforcement with the Traffic Safety Unit, hostage rescue with the SWAT Team, K-9, Bicycle Unit and crime scene investigations with UMPD Detectives. Additional teamwork and physical conditioning are accomplished through games like tug-of-war, kickball and daily obstacle courses. During camp, cadets are acquainted with numerous police officers, fire fighters, and paramedics and the camp concludes with a graduation ceremony and cookout. Cop Camp is open to well-disciplined boys and girls who reside in the Upper Merion Area School District who provide a good conduct letter from their school.

The 2020 / 2021 COP CAMPS were cancelled due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

2021 MED Rx RETURN

The Police Department joined with the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office to provide a method where people can safely dispose of unused prescriptions and over the counter medications. A Med Rx Return Box was placed in the police lobby where it is accessible 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Prescription medication, patches, pet medication, over the counter medications, and vitamins are just a few examples of the medications that can be collected. No needles, liquids or inhalers can be collected at this site. These returned medications will then be turned over to the District Attorney's Office on the National Drug Take Back Initiative that they sponsor twice a year in October and in April, to be properly disposed of where the effects of these drugs do not end up in the rivers, streams and ground water. In 2020 we collected 346.5 lbs. of prescription medication.

COMMUNITY RESPONSE ACTIVITIES AND PROGRAMS IN 2021

Internet Safety, DA National Drug Take Back Initiative, Tours of Police Headquarters, Bullying Education, Township Adventure Day Camp, Child Fingerprinting, Upper Merion Farmers Market, Police Chaplain Program, School Walk Through Program, C.A.S.T. (Community Alliance for a Safer Tomorrow), presentations to numerous businesses and houses of worship on Police Response to an Active Shooter, Cop Camp, Senior Scam Programs, Lock for Life Program, Coffee with the Cops, Police Week Demonstration, Career Days, National Night Out, Med Rx Return, Seat Belt Safety Awareness in cooperation with the Montgomery County Health Department and PennDot.

Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, some of the above listed Community Response Activities and Programs were postponed or cancelled in 2020 / 2021.

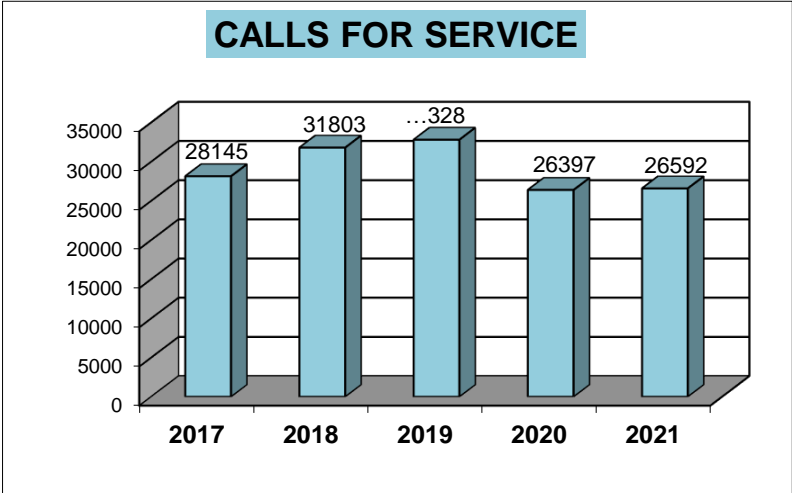
2021 NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

They teamed up with other local leaders to bring an evening of entertainment, information and fun to our community. National Night Out enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community. UMPD met with residents from various neighborhoods within Upper Merion Township to strengthen our relationship with as many residents as possible. The community had a chance to meet a large number of Upper Merion Police Officers, enjoy music, eat local food, play games and more. Community members also had the opportunity to learn about local resources and programs.

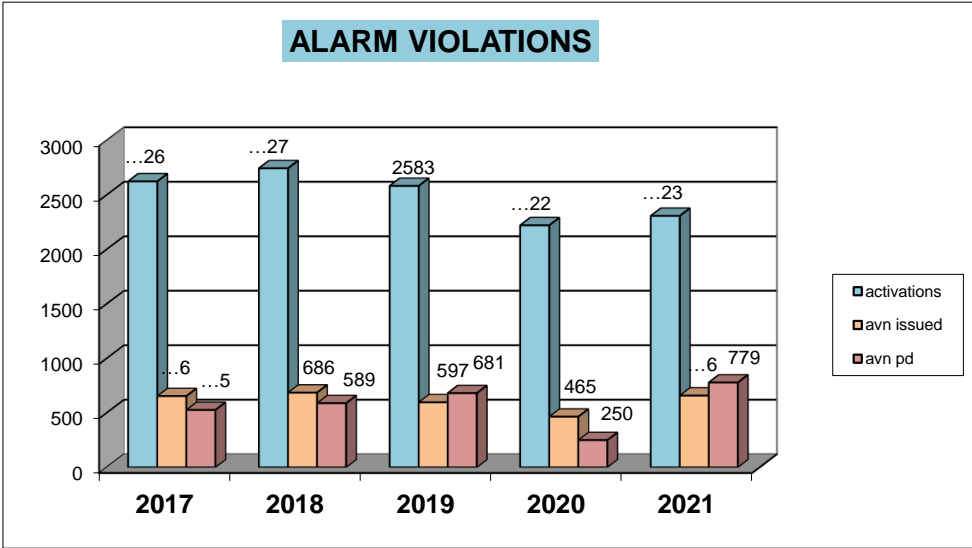
In 2021 UMPD had 26,592 Calls for Service which was an increase of 195 over 2020.

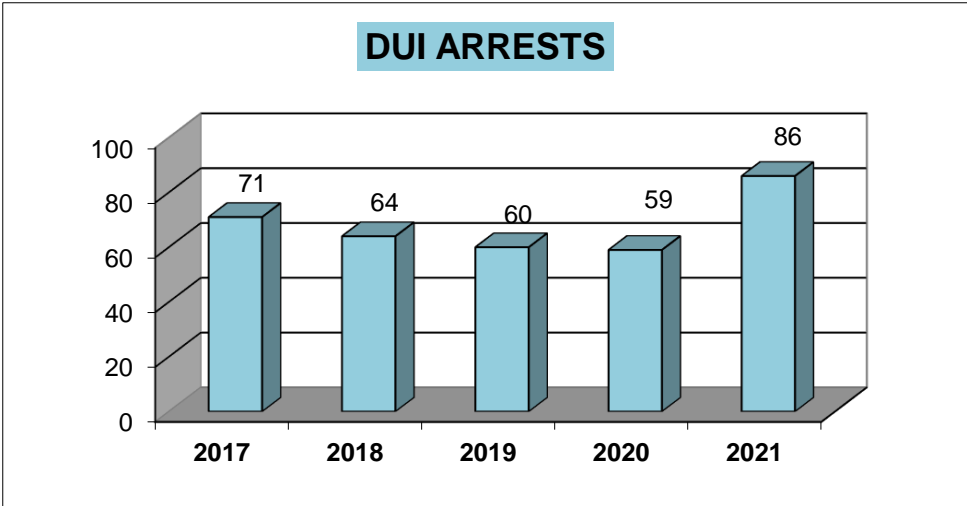

(Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs)

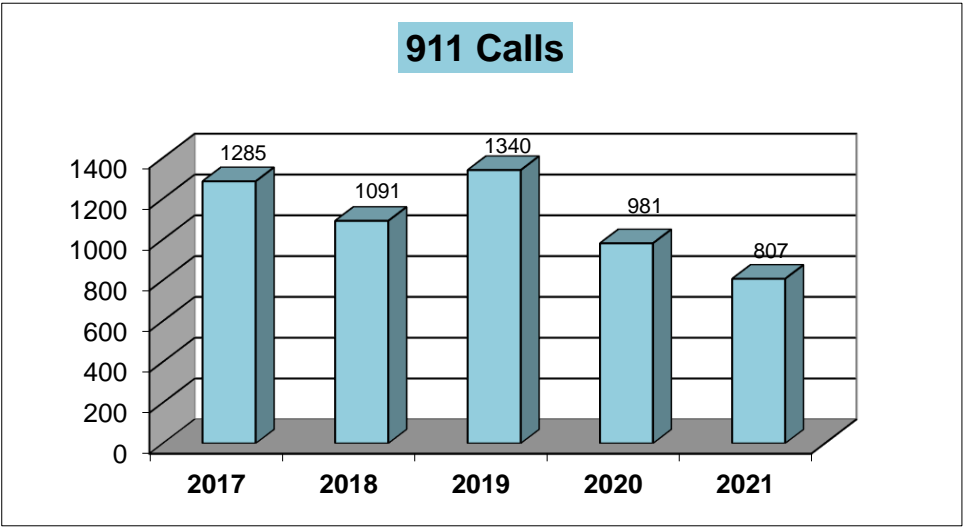
The patrol division arrested 86 drivers for driving under the influence in 2021 which was an increase of 27 over 2020. Members of the department also participated in DUI Enforcement Patrols during the year.

911 HANG-UP RESPONSES

911 hang-up responses occur when a caller contacts the Montgomery County 911 Center and hangs up before providing any information. The caller's phone number and address are automatically displayed on the County computer screen. If a County Dispatcher is unable to get an answer on call back, then the location data is transferred to our department. Two officers are dispatched to the location to check on the situation. The vast majority of 911 hang-up calls turn out to be caused by accident, yet each one must be treated as a potential emergency. The Police Department continues their efforts to reduce nuisance locations for 911 hang-up calls.

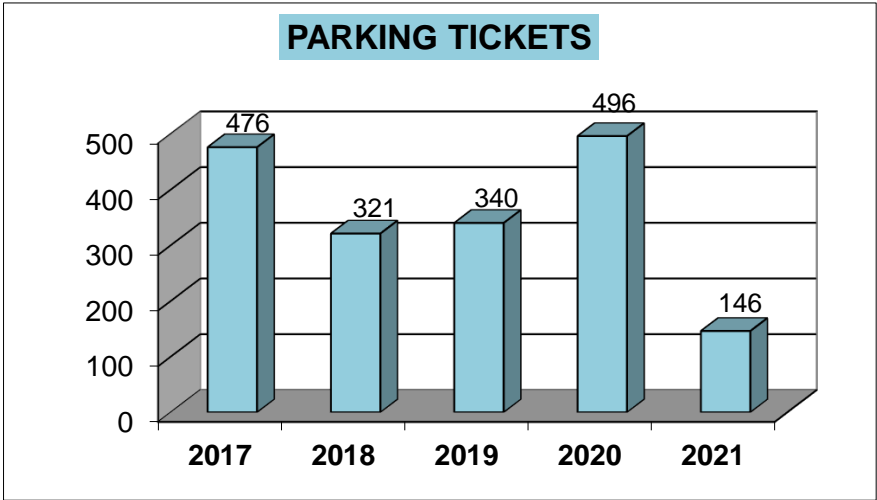


There were 807 911 Hang-Up Calls in 2021, which was a decrease of 174 from 2020.

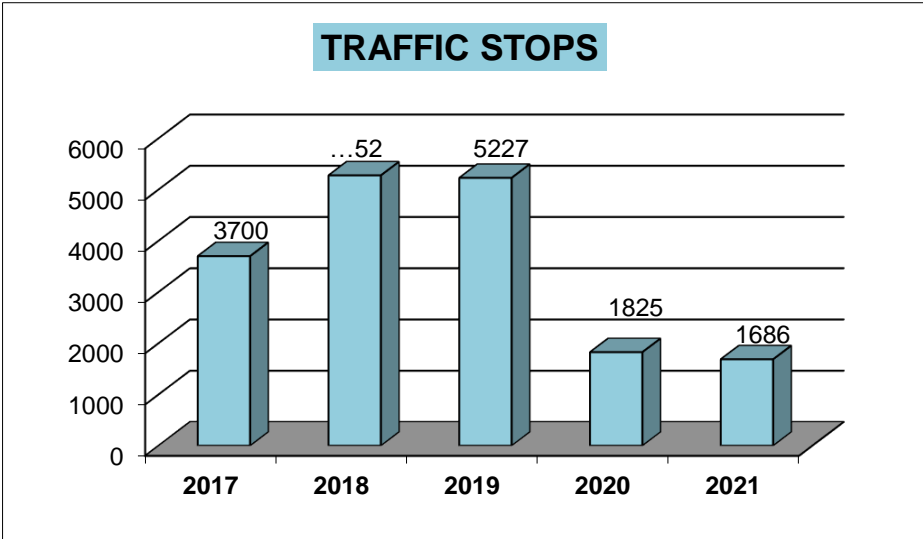

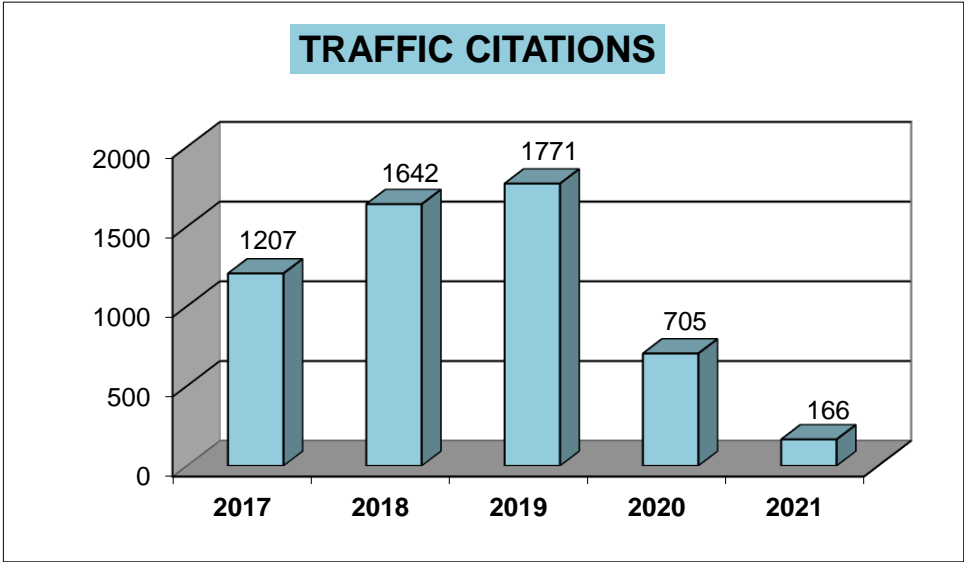

In 2021 a total of 166 Traffic Citations were issued by the Patrol Division. The 2021 total represents a decrease of 539 citations from the 2020 total.

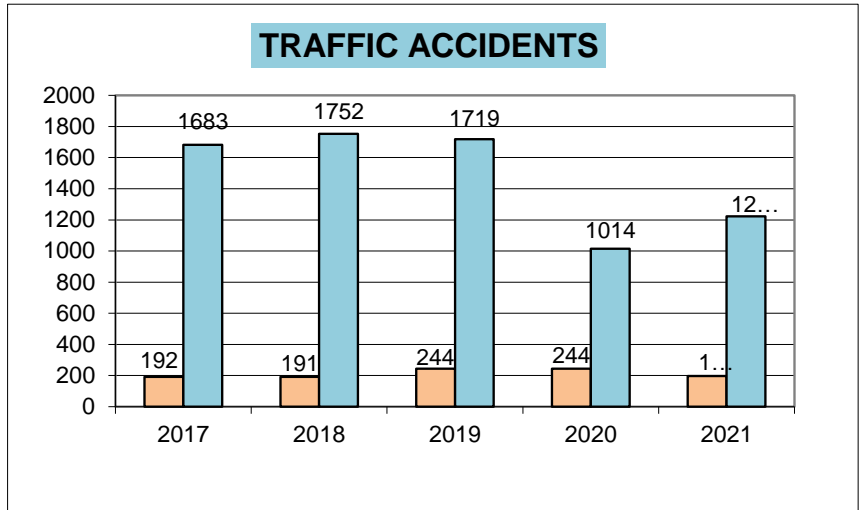

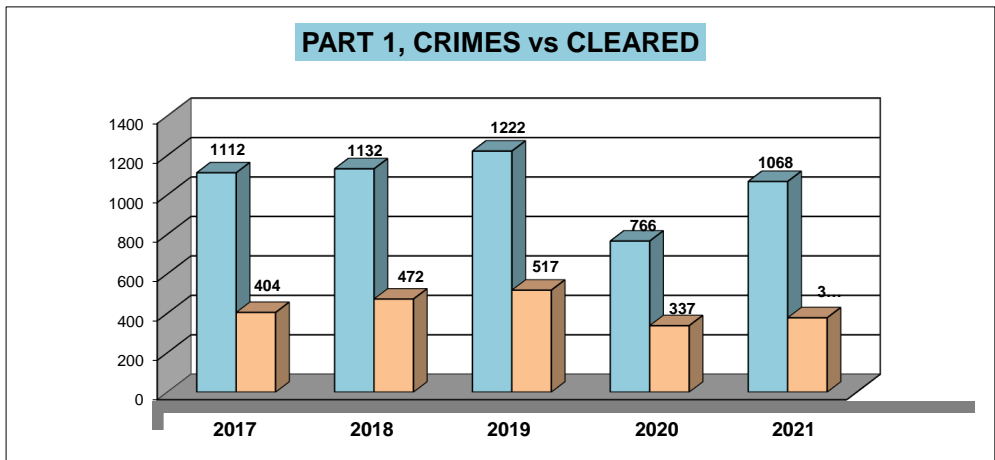

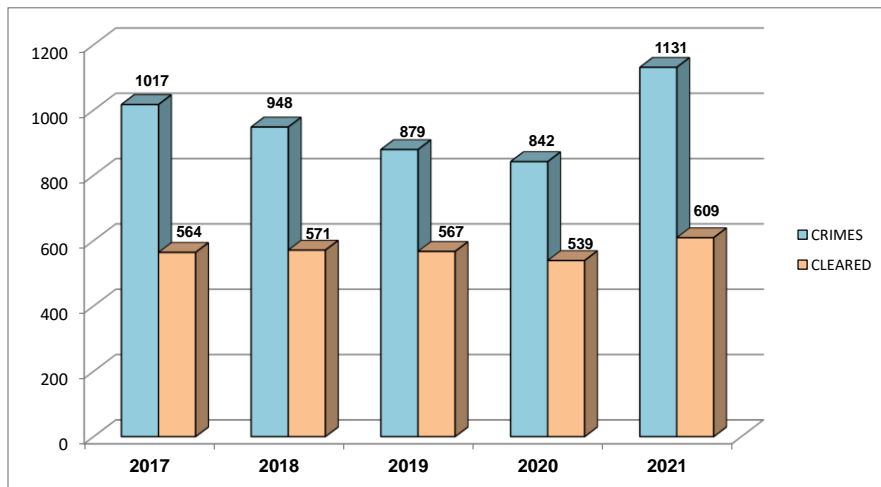
